Are human rights in Europe facing an existential crisis? The invasion of Ukraine by the Russian Federation and Russia's subsequent expulsion from the Council of Europe has posed a fundamental challenge to the European human rights framework and the values upon which the Council of Europe was founded in 1949. Democratic backsliding and the rise of populism throughout Europe (and beyond) threaten to undermine human rights standards, democracy and the rule of law. There is a need for new energy and ideas to respond to the mounting challenges to human rights in Europe including the catastrophic climate crisis, increasing hostility towards migrants and those seeking asylum, inequality, violence against women, marginalization of the LGBTQI+ community, uncertainties surrounding the role of Artificial Intelligence and how to regulate cyberspace.

The European Human Rights Law Conference is a response to this pressing need. It provides a unique opportunity to discuss not only the fears surrounding, and limitations of, human rights law as it currently stands within European states, the Council of Europe and the EU but also its future prospects and possibilities. It is evident that many of these challenges cannot be addressed by, or for, Europe alone, and thus we are particularly pleased to welcome participants from beyond Europe and those with international and comparative law perspectives.

Over a hundred papers will be presented at the Conference, covering a range of issues including, the future of the European Court of Human Rights, migrants' rights, rights adjudication before domestic courts in a number of European jurisdictions, reproductive rights, health, freedom of religion, climate litigation and LGBTQI+ rights. There are four Keynotes that will be given by Professor Conor Gearty, Professor of Human Rights Law of the London School of Economics, Baroness Brenda Hale, former President of the UK Supreme Court, Judge Paulo Pinto de Albuquerque, former judge of the European Court of Human Rights and Dr Elaine Webster, Director of the Centre for the Study of Human Rights Law at the University of Strathclyde. There are two plenary sessions involving leading human rights practitioners and representatives from human rights NGOs who will offer perspectives from practice on the challenges and future development of human rights. Finally, we are delighted to announce that the Jonathan Cooper OBE Prize will be awarded to the best paper by an early career human rights practitioner or academic.

We look forward to welcoming you in Cambridge in September 2023.
